I have seen this before and there can be hundreds of Gannet diving repeatedly into the same small area of sea. This time it was nearer 50 or so Gannet competing with the Shag. We have noticed the drop in numbers from last years Avian flu outbreak. The groups that stream through together used to be 20 or 30 in a string, now its 8 to 10 if you are lucky.
