

Purple Sandpiper - a lone bird flew past on the 26th

Sparrowhawk – often hunting the small birds around the observatory. This time it had caught a starling and ate most of it behind a rock until being flushed by Hooded Crows.

Brent Geese – 21st – 4, 23rd – 8.



Greylag Geese - around 100 Greylags, along with a large flock of Canada Geese have been seen on the Moss road fields since mid-September but these 3 seemed to be heading somewhere else as they passed the observatory on the 30th.



Little Egret - an unusual sight by the observatory Seen on the 27th heading inland, possibly heading for stinky hole.
